



Typical Signs for Boating Safety Zones

KNOW THE 5 FLOOD ZONES



IDLE



Idle Speed No Wake: Any vessel operating in a speed zone posted as "Idle Speed No Wake" must operate at the minimum speed that will maintain steerageway and headway.

SLOW



Slow Speed Minimum Wake: Any vessel operating in a speed zone posted as "Slow Speed Minimum Wake" must operate fully off plane and completely settled in water. The vessel's wake must not be excessive, which endangers or is likely to endanger other vessels or other persons using the waterway.

SAFE



Resume Normal Safe Operation: Resume a safe speed.






At certain times of the year, waters of the Suwannee and Santa Fe Rivers can rapidly fluctuate 20 - 40 feet. These fluctuations can result in flooding and hazardous boating conditions. Some boating hazards could be submerged rocks, stumps and docks as well as waterborne debris. Shoaling conditions may be prevalent during times of high water. One or more of the zones along the waterways may be impacted by water level fluctuations. Rule 68D-24.020 F.A.C. was created in an effort to protect boaters from flood hazards in the zones. Please familiarize yourself with this rule.

Be aware of signs posted along the waterway, which will display warning messages when water levels cause hazardous boating conditions. During these times, boaters should use the appropriate caution, as indicated by the signs.
